

### **Grantee Directory**

#### The Delta States Rural Development Network Grant Program

The Delta States Rural Development Network Grant Program (Delta Program) funds organizations located in the eight Delta States (Alabama, Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, and Tennessee) which address unmet local health care needs and prevalent health disparities in rural communities located in the Delta region. The Delta Program fosters collaborative efforts among rural providers, as many of these disparities could not be solved by single entities working alone. The purpose of the program is to promote the development of integrated health care networks to: achieve efficiencies; expand access to, coordinate, and improve the quality of essential health care services; and strengthen the rural health care system as a whole. Grantees are implementing multi-county evidence-based projects that address the following key focus areas: diabetes, cardiovascular disease, obesity and acute ischemic stroke.

In addition to the required key focus area(s), grantees may devote a percentage of grant funds toward another issue which may be of need in the service area. This other issue area may or may not be clinical focused, and may include areas such as pharmacy assistance, electronic health record management (funds should not go toward implementation, but rather towards enhancing the system in place), oral health, cancer screening, women's health or child poverty.

Grantees are tasked to implement programmatic activities across their entire service region, with particular effort and resources directed towards the most underserved communities with highest unmet health care and health promotion needs.

This directory provides contact information and a brief overview of the twelve initiatives funded under the Delta States Rural Development Network Grant Program in the 2016-2019 funding cycle.

Health Consortium (ICHC) will enhance and expand the successful, current schoolbased efforts by adding a strong emotional and mental health component. This expanded focus will incorporate the Signs of Suicide (SOS) curriculum, provide bullying and character education, train community and school personnel in Mental Health First Aide, and strengthen the region's mental health workforce serving school-aged children. The incorporation of social and emotional focused components reflect a shift toward the implementation of the expanded Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child (WSCC) model to improve overall health of youth in the Illinois Delta Region. The ICHC will provide leadership for building increased capacity for Illinois Delta schools to continue effectively improving school health through policy, systems, and environmental change, thus promoting sustainability and a strong fundamental attitude regarding the importance of general wellness, both in schools and in the community. This enhanced initiative encourages the use of the WSCC model as a framework for improving students' learning and health that can help prevent and lower incidence of many diseases related to sedentary lifestyles and obesity, improve Delta children's cognitive, physical, social and emotional development and ultimately impact the child poverty rate in a positive way for the region's youth.

#### **Project Goals**

The goal of creating school environments that are healthy, safe, engaged and supported are guiding the programmatic efforts of the Illinois CATCH on to Health Consortium. The key focus area of this effort is a prevention-oriented lifestyle and environmental changes targeted at creating social and physical environments that promote the health of elementary children and their families. Ultimately, through the development of these skills, the youth in the Illinois Delta region will gain the knowledge and skills to make healthy choices for a lifetime in all aspects of their lives; thereby adopting healthy eating behaviors, increasing physical activity, and developing stronger social and emotional skills. A focus on prevention will not only improve the health of Illinois Delta, but also help to move toward our overarching goals to reduce health care costs, improve quality of care, reduce chronic disease rate, increase capacity to access appropriate mental health resources, and reduce suicide rates throughout the Delta region.

#### **Project Expected Outcome**

The ICHC is working to remove barriers that allow for making the healthy choice the easy choice throughout the Delta region. But, to accomplish this task the ICHC expanded its thinking and programmatic efforts to look at all of the social determinants of health. The range of personal, social, economic, and environmental factors that influence health and often fall outside the hospital or clinic walls, vet their inter-relationship affects individual and community health. These factors disproportionately affect vulnerable and underrepresented populations and adversely affect quality of life and health for all of us. The ICHC, in order to address the social determinants of health impacting the health of Illinois Delta youth utilized, a "population health lens" when developing its proposed program plan. These efforts, in relation to the work of ICHC, propose to improve health among students, family and members of the community by strengthening understanding and impact of school wellness policies that increase physical education/physical activity, improve nutrition quality and access to foods available in schools. Specifically, the ICHC will focus on educating communities about the benefits of gardening, at home, in schools and within communities; the benefits of purchasing local foods; and encouraging use of garden produce and local food purchases in home and school menu planning; thereby, decreasing rates of chronic disease present among youth in the Delta region. Additionally, ICHC efforts will to improve the social and emotional needs of students through the implementation of character education, bullying prevention, Signs of Suicide curriculum, and providing training on Mental Health First Aid for youth and adults. The ICHC recognizes that academic achievement is an excellent indicator for the overall well-being of youth and can be a

The Mississippi SHINE Project is a community-based networking effort governed by a five-member consortium that engages a wide variety of health and social service agencies, to provide direct health outreach and services to over 27,000 individuals annually. Additional health marketing and promotion effort produce a total aggregate impact of over 1,000,000 encounters annually. The lead applicant is Jefferson Comprehensive Health Center (JCHC), a Federally Qualified Health Center in Fayette, Jefferson County, Mississippi, that has functioned as the federal lead agency for this project since 2007. The service area consists of twenty rural Delta counties in the southwest corner of the state, and the primary target population involves medically indigent residents living below the federal poverty designation. This population suffers disproportionately from hypertension, high cholesterol, diabetes, heart disease, as well as other chronic diseases caused in part by obesity. Therefore, obesity is the primary focus area of this grant. Due to the high rate of childhood poverty in the SHINE target area, this is an additional focus of this initiative. By addressing both of these issues, SHINE is well-positioned to effect significant, positive impacts on the health status of the region.

#### **Project Goals**

The goals for this project are:

**Goal 1:** Maintain and strengthen the existing community-based network of health and social service providers committed to providing enhanced services and increased access to medically disadvantaged residents, within 20 southwestern counties.

**Goal 2:** Provide health education, prevention, and obesity management services to 10,000 individuals annually.

**Goal 3:** Conduct 15,000 health screening to include BMI, blood pressure checks, glucose test screenings annually to adults and adolescents throughout the 20 counties.

**Goal 4:** Provide nutrition, oral health education, and exercise information to combat childhood poverty issues to 12,000 individuals annually.

**Goal 5:** Conduct health marketing and promotion initiatives to produce a total aggregate impact of 1,000,000 marketing encounters annually.

Key chronic disease risk factors, such as obesity and lack of physical activity, include strong lifestyle and behavioral components. This provides the MS SHINE Project with great potential to achieve positive impact on the health status of the population, through cost-effective means, such as health education, health marketing and health screenings.

Certified Community Health Workers (CCHW) work with each network to provide health information to community members, individuals, and/or groups, through meetings, seminars, health fairs and advertisements. They assist with the marketing efforts of the network members and conduct health screenings. Mississippi SHINE staff members are currently trained as CCHW, and have additional training as Certified Health Advocates through the University Medical Center.
