





# **Big Horn Basin** Healthcare Coalition

Partnerships and Collaboration in Four Counties in Northwest Wyoming

### Background

 The Big Horn Basin Healthcare Coalition wrote their charter in 2014. We became a 501©3 in the 2021/2022 fiscal year. Our funding is through the Hospital Preparedness Grant, a federal grant written and administered by the state of Wyoming. There are five Wyoming Healthcare Coalitions. Ours covers four counties in rural, frontier, Northwest Wyoming.



Our borders reach Montana, Yellowstone National Park, and the Wind River Indian Reservation.

## Challenges

• The coalition's geographical and jurisdictional boundaries encompass four counties, Big Horn, Park, Hot Springs, and Washakie in Northwest Wyoming. Our region is in Northwest Wyoming, encompassing 14,375 square miles (larger than the states of Massachusetts and Connecticut combined), with a population of fewer than 55,000 people. The population density is 3.8 people per square mile. Much of that land is federally owned. We are surrounded by a ring of mountains, with high desert, stunning rock formations, rivers, creeks, and streams.

• It is a huge area with a very sparse population, meaning coordinating healthcare delivery brings special challenges to the coalition.





 Within the coalition, there are two unique operational boundaries and opportunities that require special consideration related to emergency preparedness and response:

- Coalition members have working relationships with multiple federal entities, including Yellowstone Park, United States Forest Service, The National Park Service, Bureau of Land Management, and others. Coalition members will continue to coordinate with these entities to ensure they may appropriately respond to medical (and non-medical) emergencies that impact shared operational areas.
- The coalition shares a border with the Wind River Indian Reservation, meaning it will coordinate response activities with EMA organizations and sister coalitions (Central Wyoming Healthcare Coalition) and the Bureau of Indian Affairs to support the appropriate response.

### Boundaries

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### **Hazardous Vulnerabilities**

Hazard vulnerability analysis (HVA) and risk assessment are systematic approaches to identifying hazards or risks that are most likely to have an impact on a healthcare facility and the surrounding community. Conducting a risk assessment / HVA is also a requirement in the CMS Emergency Preparedness Rule. Environmental examples include: flooding, especially in Hot Springs County because of the Boysen Dam and the location of healthcare facilities in Thermopolis, wildland fires, potential earthquakes, tornadoes, and severe winter weather.

Other vulnerabilities include: physical vulnerability, economic vulnerability, and social vulnerability.

### **Flood Response**

Agencies Responded to a recent ice jam event in Manderson and the surrounding area on March 16<sup>th</sup>. The Manderson Fire Chief altered Big Horn County dispatch of flooding conditions on the Big Horn River. Deputies were notified and in route within three Minutes. Manderson Fire, Manderson Police, Emergency Management, Search and Rescue, and Cody Regional Health Emergency Services were all paged out to respond, assist, plan or monitor the situation within 30 minutes. Riverton National Weather Service, Wyoming Highway Patrol, the Wyoming Department of Transportation, Big Horn County Road and Bridge, Big Horn County Commissioners and Manderson Town Council all played a part in coordination of this response. An are landowner lost around 100 pregnant goats and nine puppies. She is safe, as are her horses. She was stranded and reached dry land with the help of Big Horn County Search and Rescue. Staging took place in the café parking lot, as the water was too deep for staging on the actual property. Search and Rescue deployed a small inflatable boat to bring her to dry land. They also rescued some of her dogs that were in their kennels.



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### **Partnerships**

Our goal is to actively engage key stakeholders in our local Hospital Preparedness Program (HPP)funded health care coalition.

This includes fire, emergency medical services (EMS), law enforcement and school districts, as well as the full spectrum of health care providers. When we have full scale exercises, dispatch, law enforcement, fire, and search and rescue are all active participants, as well as local industries if they are asked and consulted with. For example, Williston Basin, an oil and gas refinery, participated in our Burn Annex exercise last April. The exercise was staged at their Lovell refinery. Collaboration with schools is something we need to work on.

### **Federal and State Coordination**

We also have established relationships with federal, state and county representatives within the region. For example, in June there will be a statewide exercise lasting several days. It was designed to exercise National Guard capabilities. The Big Horn Basin HCC is participating with an exercise at Northwest College in Powell, WY. We have both a hazmat incident (radiation spill) and an active shooter exercise planned with 40 National Guard members flying in to assist with the incident. We are focusing on linking disparate networks together so as to focus their attention on improving health security capabilities. Law Enforcement, the college, Search and Rescue, Fire, EMS, Emergency Management, Public Health, and hospitals will all be involved.

The coalition can assist with coordinating the acquisition and distribution of needed supplies and supporting coordinated response and unified command across sectors. We provide a lot of training to build workforce capacity and resilience, and to increase the capability and readiness and response abilities of our healthcare partners. Training includes National Incident Management training, Stop the Bleed, active shooter, decontamination, Advance Burn Life Support and more. Our exercises are designed to test our annexes and increase our ability to respond quickly to a medical surge incident. The state of Wyoming, and our HCC, are also involved in the Mountain Plans Regional Disaster Coalition and participated in a tabletop exercise last August with them.



## **Preparedness Goals**

The more prepared we are as an organization, the better equipped we will be to support our communities when responding to an emergency. A lack of understanding of organizational and community preparedness may culminate in undue stress and exhaustion, during times of emergencies but also in anticipation of future emergencies.

Normalizing a culture of preparedness and utilizing key response concepts outside of an emergency provides an opportunity to educate and empower staff while bringing value to the goal at hand. Questions?





